All abstracts accepted for presentation at the conference will be presented as poster or as oral presentation and will be published in the abstract book. These will be available on-site at the conference.

Abstract Submission

The deadline for abstract submission is March 15, 2007, midnight CET. No abstracts will be accepted after this date.

All abstracts must be submitted online through the conference website at www.trop-amsterdam2007.com

 Abstracts must be prepared in English only.
- Abstracts must be prepared in English only.
 Abstracts sent by fax or post will not be
- accepted. The text should not exceed 300 words.

The text of the abstract should briefly state:

- Objectives (indicate the purpose of the study or the hypothesis that was tested)
- Methods (include the setting for the study, the subjects, the diagnosis or intervention and the type of statistical analysis; if references are needed, they should be given in the text)
- Results (present as clearly as possible the outcome of the study and statistical significance if appropriate)
- Conclusion (briefly discuss the data and emphasize the significance of the results)

Presenting authors should register upon submitting their abstract. The submitting author will be indicated as the corresponding author with his/her contact information. A confirmation of receipt will be sent via e-mail upon submission of an abstract. All submitted abstracts will be reviewed by the Scientific Board. A confirmation of acceptance or rejection will be sent to the corresponding author by e-mail. Authors whose abstracts have been accepted will receive further instructions for presenting their abstract.
